



1. Jesus lived bringing good news from God

Peter begins with the life of Jesus—preaching peace, doing good, healing the oppressed, and demonstrating the power of God. The gospel starts with good news: through Jesus, peace with God is available. He is not just Lord of some—He is Lord of all.

Application Questions

- What stands out to you about how Peter describes the life and ministry of Jesus?
- What does it mean for you personally that Jesus is “Lord of all,” including your life?
- Where do you most need to experience the peace that Jesus came to bring?
- How can your life reflect the same pattern of doing good and pointing others to God?

2. Jesus died bearing the condemnation we deserved

Jesus was put to death on a tree, bearing the curse of sin in our place. The cross was not an accident—it was the plan. He took the judgment we deserved so that we could receive the life we could never earn.

Application Questions

- What do you notice about how Peter talks about Jesus’ death?
- Are you carrying guilt or condemnation that Jesus has already paid for?
- What makes it difficult for you to fully accept that Jesus took your place?
- How does the truth of substitution—Jesus for you—change the way you see yourself?

3. Jesus rose saving everyone who believes

God raised Jesus on the third day, and the apostles are eyewitnesses. The resurrection proves that sin and death are defeated. Forgiveness is now available to everyone who believes—not earned, but received.

Application Questions

- What details does Peter highlight when he talks about the resurrection?
- Have you personally responded to the invitation to believe in Jesus for forgiveness?
- How does the resurrection give you confidence in your faith today?
- In what way should the reality of a risen Savior shape your daily life?

4. The Spirit fell showing no partiality

Before Peter even finishes speaking, the Holy Spirit falls on all who believe. God makes it unmistakably clear—there is no partiality. The same Spirit given to Jewish believers is now given to Gentiles. The gospel is for all.

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Application Questions

- What catches your attention about what happens when the Spirit falls?
- Where might you still struggle to believe that God's grace fully includes you?
- Who in your life might you be unintentionally excluding from the hope of the gospel?
- How can you be more intentional about following where the Spirit is already at work?
