



1. Unity in Belief, Belonging, and Possessions *Acts 4:32–33*

The early church was unified in what they believed, how they belonged to one another, and how they held their possessions. They were “of one heart and soul.” This was not forced or institutional—it was voluntary, Spirit-led unity that expressed itself through shared faith, shared mission, and shared generosity. They believed the same truth, stood together in loyalty, and held their resources loosely because “great grace was upon them all.”

Discussion Questions:

1. In what ways do you see unity of belief, belonging, or possessions being challenged in the modern church—and in your own heart?
2. What keeps you from holding your “stuff” loosely before God?
3. How can you intentionally cultivate “heart-and-soul” commitment with others in your faith community?

2. Generosity in Action to Care for All *Acts 4:34–37*

The believers’ unity overflowed into generosity—“there was not a needy person among them.” Some sold property or land, like Barnabas, who became a living example of encouragement and sacrificial giving. His generosity wasn’t required; it was a joyful act of grace. He held things loosely, gave freely, and trusted God to meet needs through his obedience.

Discussion Questions:

1. What do you learn from Barnabas about the kind of person God uses to bless others?
2. What would it look like for generosity to become a natural reflex rather than a reluctant response?
3. Are there resources, time, or abilities God has entrusted to you that He might be asking you to release for the good of others?

3. Hypocrisy Exposed and the Consequences of Sin *Acts 5:1–11*

Ananias and Sapphira’s deceit was a tragic contrast to Barnabas’s sincerity. They pretended generosity while secretly holding back and lying to the Holy Spirit. God’s response revealed the seriousness of hypocrisy within the community of faith. Their story reminds us that God sees what others can’t, and He desires honesty, purity, and integrity in His church. True generosity flows from truth in the heart, not image before others
